FORTY YEARS ON AND STILL GOING - STRONG (?!!)

It was in the Autumn of 1972 when I was approached by one of my work colleagues, Frank Sherry, who told me that because of my French ancestry and my name I would be very eligible to become a Knight Templar with the title of Chevalier, which was highly respected throughout the world. This intrigued and interested me and the next thing was I found myself at the Scottish Corporation in London's Covent Garden with full bib and tucker, including honours and awards. The function included a splendid meal during which an appeal was made for funds to support a Highlands



& Islands Home for the Elderly At the end of the meal I was informed that I was now a Squire of the Sovereign Military Order of the Temple of Jerusalem and my mentor was to be Chev Frank Sherry, the Grand Prior of Scotland.

After some research which increased my interest I attended several of these functions until 5th June 1973 when I received the Accolade from Sir John Waller Bt and became a Cheva-

lier. The service was very simple and was held in the beautiful medieval church of St Mary, Shipley, Sussex, once belonging to the original Templars. My rise through the Order from then was pretty rapid until the death of Chevalier Robert Wright, Grand Prior, in 1978 when I was appointed his successor. In 1980 while on pilgrimage in the Holy Land with Barbara I had the great honour and experience of renewing my vows before the Rev Philip Norwood, in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem. I have seen many changes in the Order since then, including three changes in the design of the Order's red cross and I believe most of our present sisters and brothers are aware of some, if not all of these changes.

Many years ago I was given a handmade book bound in red leather, which I scribed and illuminated in 2010 with the Daily Office of the Order, a long-held ambition of mine. This was blessed by our Chaplain General; Rev Michael Brain at Rothley at the AGM in 2011.

Finally, it has been my great honour and privilege to have served the Order for all these years, having met and made many lasting friendships with my fellow Templars but now my family think that after 40 years service it is time to 'put away my sword and scabbard' and join the honourable ranks of the retired! They have been saying this to me for some years but I have always managed to mislay my hearing aids.

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Steve and Lindsey Jones write about the problem of homelessness in Bristol, and of their work with three local charities improving the lives of people on the streets.

More than 20 stalwart members of the Order braved the atrocious weather to attend the H&H weekend hosted by the Greater Leeds House at the By the time you read this article Bristol City Council will have cut the number of hostel beds in Bristol by 20%, including the only female shelter. Several specialist support services for sex workers and drug and alcohol misuse have also been closed. Only 2 homeless day-centres remain open in Bristol due to a withdrawal of voluntary and government funding. At the same time, changes to benefits mean that vulnerable people are being put through distressing reassessments and losing their homes and their only source of income.

In the midst of this uncertainty we are proud to be associated with three organizations fighting to provide a lifeline to these lonely and desperate people.

The Bristol Methodist Centre is a Christian community offering shelter, sanctuary and support to homeless and vulnerable people. The Centre provides a drop-in service where support staff are on hand to chat and help with problems, free meals are served 5 days a week and guests can take part in the regular pattern of worship in the chapel. The Centre provides a friendly and non-judgmental environment where guests can relax in safety, have a coffee, make a phone call, do their laundry, have a shower and read the papers. The Day Room is a hive of activity while the Prayer Room is a sanctuary of quiet for those who wish to be still. Additional services provided by the Centre include an

art group, sewing service, one-to-one visiting, free use of the computers, movement therapy and a second-hand clothes store.

Caring at Christmas provides a safe, warm and supportive night shelter for people who are homeless in Bristol over the Christmas period. This year the shelter will be providing 50 beds, 3 meals a day, showers, clean clothes, medical services and entertainment to its guests. For many this is a particularly difficult and emotional time of year when little support is available. The guests at the shelter don't know what the New Year will bring or even if they will survive the winter months. On New Year's Eve people on the street are particularly vulnerable and open to abuse by "party goers" coming home from parties and pubs who then attack and abuse the people they find in doorways. Caring at Christmas also produces a Survival Handbook of information about accommodation, healthcare, day-centres, food, advice, support and other services in the Bristol area.

The Bristol Soup Run Trust operates a nightly soup run to ensure that food and other essential supplies are available, free of charge, to homeless and needy people on the streets of Bristol. A dedicated team of volunteers turns out with their own food, whatever the weather, to two meeting points in the City centre. Other people who are too scared to come out of the shadows may be visited on a one to one basis. Soup, hot drinks, food, blankets, clothes and toiletries are distributed along with information on accommodation, help with addiction, and day-centre facilities. Informal, friendly and non-judgmental conversation is a human lifeline to the 80+ people who queue for the soup run every night. For many of them, the volunteers are the only people they have spoken to that day.

At this difficult time of year we would urge all our fellow Templars to consider the plight of these desperately needy people and to help in any way you can. In the words of the wonderful hymn by F. Pratt Green:

Across the world, across the street The victims of injustice cry For shelter and for food to eat, And never live until they die. We have no mission but to serve In full obedience to our lord; To care for all, without reserve, And spread his liberating word.

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Thanksgiving Service for Bill Chapman

A Service of Thanksgiving for the Life of William Thomas James Chapman (know to all as Bill) was held on 11 June 2012 at St Mark's Methodist Church in Yeovil; following his unexpected death at home on Sunday 27 May at the age of 68 years. Bridget and John Titcomb attended on behalf of the Preceptory of St Bernard of Clairvaux and the Grand Priory; and Simon Le Fevre attended on behalf of the Templar Heritage Trust, of which Bill was chairman.

During the service conducted by the minister, the Reverend Christina Le Moignan, we learned something of Bill's happy and mischievous childhood (one story being about the sun, a magnifying glass, the garden hedge and the inevitable results!) and his education in his home town of Yeovil. There was also reference to the career which led him to a senior management position in a local engineering firm and later into consultancy on environmental engineering. He was also a tireless volunteer, taking on roles in the local business community, the Scouts, the RNLI and various heritage organisations. Although a life-long Methodist, Bill had a strong ecumenical interest, and became a Franciscan Tertiary and a member of an advisory committee in the Church of England Diocese of Bath &

Wells as well as being much in demand as a Methodist lay preacher. Bill's role in our Order was also duly acknowledged.

His wife, Rose, was supported at the Service by many members of Bill's extended family and by numerous friends, former colleagues and representatives of the organisations he had been involved with during his life.

In fact, the congregation was so large that the church was already full an hour before the service started; and the additional congregation crowded into the adjacent church hall and even several marquees set up in the car park! This was a great tribute to the affection in which Bill was held and to everyone's gratitude for his years of service.

The Service closed with the Scout Song by Ralph Reader (familiar as: 'Riding along on the crest of a wave'); which would, people felt, have appealed to Bill's sense of humour.

Grand Prior's Letter

Brothers and Sisters

The new year is now well established and I share with you just a few of the happenings 2012 before looking forward to 2013.

Firstly, congratulations to Grand Prior Emeritus Denys Le Fevre who achieved his 40th anniversary in the Order in October. A small group of us were able to assemble in the Church of St Botolph without Bishopsgate in London on October 13th when we held a service to commemorate the sacrifices of the early members of our Order and also to cele-

brate Denys's 40 years of service.

Our thanks are due to John Harcourt who has decided that it is time to stand down as Deputy Grand Prior and Seneschal after serving the Order in and several other capacities for a number years. I am sure that all members who have known and worked with John will want to join me in paying tribute to his hard work, valued contribution and unique sense of humour. Whilst John has filled the dual role Chapter has decided that in future the offices of deputy Grand Prior and Seneschal will be separated.

I must also pay tribute to the activities of the Greater Leeds House

whose enthusiasm has resulted in the formation of a new Preceptory (the Yorkshire Preceptory) which will be dedicated to St Everilda. Chev Brian Goodall is Preceptor elect and the New Preceptory and Preceptor will be formally ratified at our AGA next March.

During 2012 most Preceptories and some Houses have been active in getting together for social occasions including at least two other Christmas events in addition to the long standing St. Augustine Preceptory Advent dinner which was held on November 24th in Canterbury. There is no doubt that the current financial crisis is affecting us all and events local to groups of members are not only good for fellowship but also more economic in terms of travelling distances and costs.

On the International Front it is my responsibility to represent the Order at OSMTH- KTI meetings and this year I was in Helsinki in September and Erika represented us at a meeting in Texas in June. There are now 20 Grand Priories in OSMTH-KTI Argentina, Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Canada, Croatia, Denmark, England & Wales, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Mexico, NATO, Norway, Portugal, Romania, Serbia, USA.

I have already mentioned the current financial crisis which is affecting every European country and I have proposed that the OSMTH-KTI Grand Magistral Council, of which all Grand Priors are members, should consider the possibility of reducing

the costs of our international meetings by holding only one a year instead of the current two. This proposal will be discussed at the OSMTH-KTI Spring meeting in Tomar, Portugal.

The OSMTH-KTI positions of International Grand Commander, Deputy Grand Commander and Chancellor General all come up for re-election this year and as you know Simon LeFevre is one of the nominees for the post of Grand Commander. Elections will be held at the Tomar meeting.

Our AGA will be held over the weekend March 9/10th and by the time you read this you will have received the booking form and details from our Chancellor. For newer members can I explain that at this meeting Officers and Preceptors will

be presenting annual reports and the accounts and budgets will be available for discussion and agreement. Our Constitution (the document which guides and controls everything we do) has over the past 18 months been subject to review and updating. The current edition is some 10 years old. This and other important papers will be sent out to you shortly so please read them carefully and come to the AGA well prepared for any debate and decision. I look forward to meeting you there.

Also at the AGA, following our discussions last year, we must get to grips with some important questions (hopefully followed by practical actions).

Among these are:

Why did we become Templars?
Are we fulfilling the aims hopes and aspirations which we had at our investiture - and which are embodied in our official 'raison d'etre'?
Where are we going?
What do we need to do to get there?

Can I assure you that we are not alone here.......... OSMTH-KTI is also asking the same questions.

Finally, my thanks to all who have assisted and supported me over the past year.

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A busy year for the St Bernard Preceptory

December marked the end of a busy year for the Preceptory of St Bernard of Clairvaux. On 13th December Dame Lindsey Jones presented a cheque for £110 to Caring at Christmas - the homeless night shelter in Bristol - as voted for by our Preceptory members. The shelter served 150 hot meals a day and accommodated over 50 homeless people overnight during the Christmas week and is manned and funded entirely by volunteers. During 2012 the Preceptory gave a total of £230 to good causes including Emaus Orphan Children of Spain, the RNLI, the British Legion, Caring at Christmas and Templar general funds.

We marked the end of the year with a very enjoyable Christmas Lunch at the Cold Harbour Inn near Swindon where we were delighted to welcome members from around the UK. We were especially pleased to see Edna Jones, a Friend of the Order (and the Chancellor's Mum!) who had recently been unwell and was venturing out for the first time since leaving hospital.

May we take this opportunity to wish all members of the Order and their loved ones a happy and blessed 2013 and we look forward to sharing fellowship with you all during the coming year.
