#### What Happens in Philadelphia ...

hat happens (or happened) in Philadelphia should not stay in Philadelphia. It is a city to see and be seen. It is a history that needs to be shared with everyone who comes here. Philadelphia is our national heritage.

There are many points of interest to see before, during or after the 51<sup>st</sup> Grand Convent and Investiture (June 6-8). There are must-see historical sites and architectural interests, as well as cultural and unique venues. They are all national treasures

that will give you an opportunity to develop a better understanding of our American history.

Independence Hall, located on the South side of Chestnut Street, between 5th and 6th streets, is the birthplace of the Declaration of Independence and the United States Constitution. You do not have to risk your "lives, fortunes or sacred honor" to experience one of the greatest events of our young Republic. The Pennsylvania State House, which was finally completed in 1753, became the principal meeting place for the Second Continental Congress. The windows were closed in the blistering summer of 1776, where the fifty-six delegates from the colonies met to craft the Declaration of Independence. Twelve states were

represented in 1787, to draft the United States Constitution which united our nation. Admission is free, but tickets are required.

Liberty Bell Center is located at 526 Market Street, just down Liberty Mall from Independence Hall. Archeological remnants from 1790-1800 were exposed when the Liberty Bell Center was excavated on the site of the Presidential Mansion of George Washington and John Adams. There are displays with facts about the Liberty Bell and interpretive panels explaining the significance of the slave quarters.

Professor Constance McGrieff describes the Liberty Bell as "the most venerated object in the park, a national icon...it is irreparably damaged. Perhaps that is part of its almost mystical appeal. Like our democracy it is fragile and imperfect, but it has weathered threats, and it has endured." Admission is free.

National Constitution Center, 525 Arch Street, (215) 409-6700, seeks to expand awareness and understanding of the United States Constitution. The *Freedom Rising* presentation at the institute's theater dramatically explains the history of the Constitution and how *We the People* has expanded over time. The main exhibit hall presents a chronology of constitutional history through artifacts, original documents and interactive exhibits. You can hang out with the original signers in the "Signers Hall" or have your picture taken with one or all of the thirty-nine, now memorialized life-size bronze statues. Learn how you can participate in a key Supreme Court case, don judicial robes and debate Justice John Roberts' decision on Obama Care or take a

stand on the Second Amendment.

Arch Street Friends Meeting House, located at 5th and Arch Streets, is the oldest meetinghouse of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) still in use in the United States. Pennsylvania founder and Quaker William Penn donated the land to the Society in 1693 as a burial ground for members. The meetinghouse was built between 1803 and 1805 atop the gravevard and then enlarged in 1811, when the west wing was added to accommodate the Women's Monthly Meeting. The original east wing now houses exhibits on the life of Penn, and the west wing is used for meetings for worship.

Gloria Dei Old Swedes'

**Church**, located at Columbia Blvd. & Christian Street (916 S. Swanson St.), is one of the eight Old Swedes Churches of New Sweden. You will marvel at its quaint architecture, carved cherub and 17<sup>th</sup> Century model sailing ships suspended from the ceiling over the main aisle. Gloria Dei's roots are traced back to 1646 and to the distinguished missionary, **Johannes Campanius**, who translated Martin Luther's *Small Catechism*. The present church, which was remodeled in 1999, is the oldest church in Pennsylvania.

Valley Forge National Historical Park is only 18 miles West of Philadelphia by car or public transportation. This National Park reflects the heroic struggle of the Continental Army and their survival in the winter of 1777-78. It was here that 12,000 of

## RADM Chev. Andrew P. O'Rourke, GCTJ, GMTJ\* Grand Prior XII (1933-2013)



rom Hell's Kitchen to flag rank might well describe the life experiences of RADM Chev. Andrew Patrick O'Rourke. GCTJ, GMTJ. Andy, as he is best known to his Templar brothers and sisters, died in the Bronx on Thursday night, January 3. He was 79 years old. His death at Calvary Hospital resulted from complications of cancer. Andy, who had

been treated for Parkinson's disease as well, lived in Yorktown.

When Grand Prior XII O'Rourke was growing up in New York City's Hell's Kitchen, it resembled more the rough and tumble days described by **Damon Runyan** than the West Side of Manhattan of today. Even so, he was one of the original radio "Whiz Kids" before he attended Fordham University on a Hayden Science Award scholarship.

Andy is described in his obituary as ruddy-faced and silverhaired man, who brought a witty, bantering manner to his performance in government as well as to the campaign trail when he agreed to take on the all-but-hopeless task of unseating Governor Cuomo. He laughed off its seeming futility, saying, "They told Goliath: 'Don't worry. It's only a kid out there.'"

Andrew Patrick O'Rourke was born in Plainfield, New Jersey on October 26, 1933, the youngest of five children. His father, a doctor, died of tuberculosis when Andy was not yet 2. Eight years later, his mother became blind. The family had to subsist on welfare, a point that Andy often mentioned in defending Westchester County's welfare program, even as he required recipients to work for their benefits.

Andy delivered fish and worked as an usher in the Paramount Theater on Times Square, after the family moved to the Hell's Kitchen neighborhood in Manhattan in the 1940s. He was a child actor, appearing briefly on Broadway and regularly as a guest on a coast-to-coast radio children's quiz show.

Andy graduated from the Civil Air Patrol to join New York's famed Fighting Sixty-Ninth National Guard Regiment. However, he was sent home after serving two years in the regiment because he was underage. The former private Andy O'Rourke was recognized by the Secretary of the Army as a distinguished member of the 69th Regiment of New York.

Andy trained as an Air Force bombardier and navigator after he graduated from Fordham University. He received a law degree from Fordham and went into private law practice in Yonkers. Entering Yonkers politics, he served on the Yon-

ent Grand Commander, our own Grand Prior XV MG Chev. **Robert Disney**, will be stepping down this year and we will need a replacement. I will present a more complete report at our Grand Council meeting in Philadelphia this June.

kers City Council and Westchester County's Board of Legislators before he was appointed County Executive in 1983.

Andy had the second-longest tenure of any Westchester County executive. (1983-1997). While in office, he built a new county jail, a recycling plant and a new airport terminal, reopened Rye Playland as a county amusement park, required that welfare recipients go to work to earn their benefits and presided over the building of permanent shelters for the homeless.

Andy pursued a side vocation writing adventure fiction, including the novels The Red Banner Mutiny, based on a 1975 insurrection aboard a Soviet destroyer, and Hawkwood, about a soldier of fortune. He wound down his career as the senior State Supreme Court justice for Putnam County.

Andy O'Rourke was invited to join the Sovereign Military Order of the Temple of Jerusalem in 1994, soon after he met Chevalier **F. Daniel Coleman**, Prior V. Although Chev. O'Rourke was invested into the Priory of St. King Charles the Martyr, he was requested by Prior **James Carey**, to form a commandery in New York's Hudson Valley, where he became Commander and then Prior I from 1995 to 1998. Andy O'Rourke served as Grand Chan-

cellor under Grand Prior XI, COL Chev. **Stewart Boone McCarty**, GCTJ, GMTJ and was installed as Grand Prior XII in 2000.

Grand Prior O'Rourke decided to reconstitute the Military Order of Saint Louis as a Templar decoration. The medal bears a Templar Cross on the reverse and is awarded annually by the Priory of St. Patrick. It is presented to deserving individuals in recognition their contribution to military and naval literature, and/or to works which heighten an awareness of the plight of Christians at Risk.

Andy's marriage to the former **Alice T. McKenna**, who died in 2011, ended in divorce. He is survived by his wife, Flora Lowe, three children from his first marriage (**Alice**, **Aileen** and **Andrew** Jr.) and six grandchildren.

#### **GPUSA 2013 Scholarship Program**

he SMOTJ-GPUSA Scholarship Program was developed out of an initial offering of two high school scholarships in the Holy Land in honor of Grand Prior Wayne McGrath in the summer of 2010. Currently, the Grand Priory is supporting 34 high school children and five university nursing students in the Holy Land. Providing financial support for scholarships to students in the Holy Land and elsewhere has become a critical component of our mission to protect Christians at risk. The support and enthusiasm for the program was so overwhelming positive that it expanded faster than envisioned. As a result, steps are being taken to establish an internal organization that can efficiently manage the program, and thus ensure its continued expansion.

#### **Proclamation 2013-1**

Effective this date the SMOTJ-GPUSA Scholarship Program is implemented. Full presentation is put forth in the attached draft appendix, Appendix U, to the Manual of the Order and defines how this program is intended to function. The procedures therein are also effective immediately, to include the movement of the financial management of all scholarships to the General Raymond G. Davis Foundation, Inc. ("RDF"), our 501 (c) (3) charitable entity. Funds for all new or existing scholarships must now be sent to RDF which has the following address:

## The General Raymond G. Davis Templar Foundation

he General Raymond G. Davis Templar Foundation, Inc. (*Templar Founda*tion) Board of Directors elected Grand Prior **Keith Larson** to serve as board chairman. His election took place in June at the Grand Convent and Investiture in San Antonio.

Pelham Curtis, GCTJ, GMTJ became vice-chairman as the sitting Grand Prior, in accordance with the foundation's by-laws.

The Templar Foundation is the 501 (c) (3) arm of GPUSA and was created to enable our knights and dames to endow the work of the GPUSA through a legacy gift or as part of their estate plan.

Chairman Larson developed and expanded the Order's Holy Land Scholarship Program as Grand Prior. Chairman Larson proposed to Grand Prior Curtis and his EXCOM that the administrative funding of the scholarships be moved from the Grand Priory to the Templar Foundation. Those priories or individuals who wish to sponsor a student in the Holy Land will continue to remit their contributions to the Jerusalem Mite Scholarship Program.

Once these scholarship funds are received at the GPUSA head-quarters, they will be transferred to the Templar Foundation pending actual delivery to the respective schools in the Holy Land and elsewhere. These earmarked funds can be delivered directly to the schools, as they do not have to pass through a 501 (c) (3) partner, inasmuch as the Templar Foundation is an IRS recognized 501 (c) (3) entity. This makes our charitable works transparent to our knights and dames and to the organizations receiving our gifts.

GPUSA and the Templar Foundation established an agreement that designates these funds as encumbered. They will be used only for the specific scholarships for which they were raised. They cannot be diverted or used for any other purpose. It is hoped that by assigning the Scholarship Program to the Templar Foundation's administration, members will be encouraged to make gifts to the foundation as part of their estate planning. This will allow for further expansion of the Scholarship Program.

The topic of creating a legacy gift within your estate will be further explored in future issues of the *Beauséant*. One does not have to be wealthy to be able to make such a gift. Stay tuned.



he Priory of St Patrick held its annual Military Order of St Louis Award program in last fall. The medal was awarded to distinguished author **George C. Daughan**, Ph.D., in recognition of his contributions to military and naval literature, for his book on 1812: *The Navy's War*. Illness prevented him from receiving the medal in person. This award recognizes the contributions made to military/naval

literature, and/or to works which heighten awareness of the plight of "Christians at Risk," particularly in the Holy Land/Terra Santa.

Dr. Daughan's book tells the heroic story of battle-tested American commanders, seamen and privateers who fought against all odds in this war. They defeated the mighty Royal Navy, time and again, and played a key role in this "Second War for Independence." Dr. Daughan received the Samuel Eliot Morison Award for Naval Literature, on another occasion, for his book on *If by Sea: The Forging of the American Navy* from the Revolution to the War of 1812.

Rear Admiral Chev **J. Robert Lunney**, GOTJ, who displayed his skill as a most entertaining raconteur, agreed to step in for Dr. Daughan and discuss Bill Gilbert's book, *Ship of Miracles: A Korean War Rescue* at this awards event. It tells the story of the last ship out of Hungnam at the end of the Chosin (Chang Jin) Reservoir Campaign.

The Military Order of Saint Louis originated in the ancièn régième of Bourbon France as a mark of military merit. It was reconstituted for the purpose of recognizing significant activities for better understanding of the military contributions of France, to the achievement and defense of the United States during the American Revolution. Prior I **Andrew P. O'Rourke** (later Grand Prior XII), instituted the award in 1999 at the Priory of Saint Patrick. The medal now bears a Templar Cross on the reverse side.

Washington's troops experienced great suffering and rejuvenation, and where Baron Frederich von Steuben provided professional military training and developed a training manual that was a model for the United States military throughout the 19<sup>th</sup> Century. Valley Forge was a turning point in the Revolutionary War.

University of Pennsylvania Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology is located at 3260 South Street, Philadelphia, telephone (215) 898-4001. The University has conducted over 400 expeditions and over 30 galleries, which feature items from around the world and throughout the ages. There are collections from China, Egypt, Iraq, and Meso-America. You will see outstanding collections from the Royal Tombs of Ur, Aztecan artifacts and a 13-ton granite Sphinx, the third largest in the world. The outstanding architecture housing the China exhibit is seen in one of the largest unsupported masonry domes in America. The Egyptian collection is known worldwide.

Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, F&AM (Masonic Temple) is located at One North Broad Street, Philadelphia, telephone (215) 988-1900. It is a showcase of grand, almost mystical, architecture and design. The exterior façade is of Quincy granite in a neo-classical Norman style of architecture. The interior

surfaces are covered with fine art images, which are found everywhere on the walls and ceiling. There are seven rooms of individual architectural style: Ionic Hall, Doric Hall, Corinthian Hall, Gothic Hall, Egyptian Hall, Oriental Hall and Norman Hall.

**Franklin Institute** at 222 North 20<sup>th</sup> Street is one of the most beloved and oldest science museums in America. It probably led to the use of the word "interactive" because of its handson exhibits, even before that word became fashionable. The Tuttleman IMAX Theater boasts of a 79-foot, domed screen for galaxies and deep space exploration through America's highest technology. There is a 3-D theater and indoor Sky Bike.

Philadelphia Museum of Art is located at 2600 Benjamin Franklin Parkway, which is among the largest art museums in the country. It has a collection of over 227,000 objects, including world-class American and European paintings, prints, drawings and decorative art. The museum covers ten acres and houses 300,000 works spanning 2,000 years. There is an entrance fee for admission.
